

I. DON BOSCO

The College is named after St John Bosco, popularly known as Don Bosco, the founder of the religious and educational order 'Salesians of Don Bosco.' Don Bosco was born in 1815, in a poor family near Turin, Italy. By dint of hard work and heroic sacrifices he became a priest in 1841. He dedicated himself to the service of poor youth, offering them food, shelter and education. He opened for them



schools, technical schools, youth hostels and oratories. He founded a society of collaborators and extended his work all over Europe and eventually to all continents. Don Bosco died on 31 January 1888 and was declared a saint on 1 April 1934.

Don Bosco based his system of education on the three pillars of Reason, Religion and Loving Kindness. He looked after the youth as a caring father, and dedicated himself totally to their welfare. He visualized education in the context of the needs of the community. Vocational guidance, training and job placement were integral to his educational system.

II. DON BOSCO SOCIETY

Don Bosco Society, also known as 'The Salesians of Don Bosco' is a Religious Order of the Catholic Church. The Society has over 16,000 members working in 136 countries. Through a global network of educational and social service organizations which include 15 universities, 58 institutes of higher education and thousands of schools and social development centres, it cares for the less privileged and marginalized sections of society. Don Bosco institutions currently cater to over fifteen million young people across the world. Because of its outreach and expertise in the field of education, the Society enjoys consultancy status at the United Nations (UN) and has a permanent office in the UN headquarters in New York.

III. DON BOSCO SOCIETY IN INDIA

In India, the Salesians of Don Bosco began their operations in 1906. From a humble beginning with a trade school and hostel for poor children at Thanjavoor, Tamil Nadu, the Society today has over 2500 members. Its services are offered through a university, 31 colleges, over 100 technical schools, and a large network of high schools and scores of non-formal, vocational, technical and agricultural training centres, spread across the country, covering a vast spectrum of social development. The society also runs literacy centres, homes for street children and rehabilitation and relief centres.

IV DON BOSCO COLLEGE, TURA

Don Bosco College, Tura, is an educational institution of the Catholic Church, belonging to the global Don Bosco Society and managed by the Salesians of Don Bosco, North East India, with headquarters in Guwahati, Assam. The Salesian Provincial Superior is the President of the Governing Body of the College. The College was established in 1987 with the intention of bringing higher education within the reach of the people of Garo Hills.

The College has distinguished itself as one of the premier institutions of higher education in Meghalaya. Today with over a hundred teaching and non-teaching staff, the College caters to about 2500 students.

It has been awarded 'B' Grade by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) in 2011.

VIII. ADMISSION PROCESS

Morning Shift

The college has a morning shift for Degree courses in Arts. Interested candidates can apply for Admission. Morning Shift classes starts at 6.30 a.m. from Monday to Saturday.

Eligibility: Students with an aggregate of 40% and above may apply for admission for Morning Shift.

 The morning shift is intended to assist those students who are working during the day and have the desire to do their studies. Such students are encouraged to apply for the Morning Shift.

Issue of Application Forms

The admission process for the Bachelors' Degree Courses commences after the declaration of the results of the HSSLC Examinations (Arts, Commerce, Science) of the Meghalaya Board. The forms are available at the College office on payment of Rs. 500/or may be downloaded from the College website www.donboscocollege.ac.in and send, duly filled forms, to the College office. The students can also fill up the application form online and submit it online using the college website.

Eligibility: Students with an aggregate of 45% and above may apply for admissions. The eligibility norms are outlined in the following programme structure for graduate courses in each stream.

 Students scoring 60% aggregate Marks in any stream in Class XII and having gone through the Central Universities Entrance Test (CUET) will be given priority in admission.

(Those students who are directly admitted also need to meet their respective Honours Teachers for verification of their credentials). Ensure your Test/Interview card is endorsed by the Interview Board, certifying your having appeared in the interview.

Admission

- Admitted candidates will have their Form Numbers displayed on the notice board and website.
- Fees must be paid within the due date, failing which the admission shall stand cancelled.
- Rank holders in the qualifying examinations shall be given priority in admission.

- Outstanding sports persons who have been recognised at the State/National level will be accorded consideration.
- A few seats are reserved for differently-abled persons, minimum criteria, however, will be applicable.

- College Fees and tuition fees are to be paid for 12 Months (July to June)
- Students are to pay Fees through SBI Green Channel or Internet Banking.
- All financial transactions such as fee payments, refunds etc. would be done only through bank transaction.
- Fees up to December 2022 must be cleared before 15th November 2022.
- Fees up to July 2023 must be cleared before 15th June 2023.
- Those who do not clear fees as prescribed above will not be issued Admit Cards for Examinations.
- NEHU Examination Fees (including Enrolment & Registration fee) will be charged extra as prescribed by the University.
- · Fees once paid will not be refunded.
- Monthly fees are to be paid by the 10th of each month, failing which a fine of Rs. 50/will be charged for each month of delay.



The College is affiliated to the North Eastern Hill University for the (NEHU). The duration of the U.G. Courses is three years, divided into six semesters. The College holds its own tests and other methods for internal assessment.

Identity Cards, College Handbook

Identity cards will be issued to each student. Identity cards are to be worn daily to the College and produced for every type of transaction in the College. A student will use the ID Card to enter and exit the Library and for issuing of Library Books. Each student will be issued a Handbook, which is to be brought to the College daily.

College Uniform

The students have the uniform and have to wear the uniform daily when they come to the college.

Attendance

Seventy five percent (75%) attendance is compulsory. Attendance will be taken for each lecture. A student absenting himself/ herself from one or more classes will lose the day's attendance. Students who do not have the required attendance will be debarred from Examinations. Any student who is absent for one month will have his/her name removed from the College. Admission Fees will have to be paid anew if the student is allowed to join back. A student who is consecutively absent for more than three days will have to provide a medical certificate in case of sickness or a letter signed by the parents. Students should submit leave applications on prescribed form.

Timings of Different Shifts

Shift 1 (Morning Shift) -06:30 am to 09:30 am Shift 2 (Day Shift) -09:45 am to 03:30 pm Don Bosco College is located in a sylvan surrounding, against the background of the imposing Tura Peak, overlooking a vast expanse of hills, valleys, plains and rivers. The campus, with its breath-taking view, impressive buildings, pleasing layout, green lawns and shady trees, creates a congenial environment for study and relaxation.

Academic Complex

Considered by many to be one of the finest buildings in North East India, the Academic Complex is a vast yet compact structure, housing (a) the Administrative Block (b) the Science Block (c) the Arts Block (d) the Commerce Block (e) the Library and (f) the Computer Centre.

Hostels & Staff Quarters

The College has 2 hostels: (a) Don Bosco College Boys' Hostel and (b) Margaret Bosco Girls' Hostel. Admissions for the hostels are granted as per the policies of the management of the College.

The College has a set of spacious staff quarters comprising eight family flats.

Conference Hall

The College has a Conference Hall with Audio Visual facilities that can accommodate 200 participants for various seminars and programmes.

Bosco Hall

The college has a hall with seating capacity of 250 for department seminars/ workshops. It has an Audio Visual Facility.



Fr. Battista Busolin Memorial Library

The College has a collection of about 30,000 books and several journals and newspapers. The reading room provides an atmosphere of peace and quiet, is an invitation to staff and students to enrich themselves by seeking information, knowledge and wisdom. The library offers additional services like photocopy, internet and question banks. The Library has a 24x7 free Internet facilities for the students. The Library uses Koha Library Open Source Software.

Science Labs

The College is well equipped with laboratories for Physics, Chemistry, Biology (Botany and Zoology), Geography and Commerce.

Computer Labs

The College has a well-equipped computer centre with 60 computers. The College also has an internet cafe with 40 terminals. The internet is available for the staff and students.

Canteen

The College has a well furnish canteen where staff and students are served snacks and other refreshments.

Sports Complex

The College has a basketball and a volleyball court. It encourages participation in sports and games, particularly in Basketball, Volleyball, Football, Cricket and indoor games. The College teams take part in the various sports events organized by the university, state and local bodies.

Fr. Anthony Buccieri Memorial Gymnasium

The Gymnasium strives to provide high quality gymnastics in a positive, safe and enjoyable environment as part of an overall mission to support young students in their physical, mental and social development.

The Gymnasium consists of a Six Station multi gym, treadmills, exercises bikes, indoor cycles, punch bags, multipurpose fitness benches and various dumbbells of different weight.

College Bus

The College operates a bus which connects various localities of Tura Town to the College Campus. Students can avail College bus facility by taking passes which are valid for one entire semester.

XI. SUPPORT SERVICES

Short Term Courses and Soft Skills

The College offers a number of short term courses and so skills for the benefit of the students, to enable them acquire employable skills and aptitudes and for their personality development. The College gives certificates to students who successfully complete these courses.

Basic Course in Computer Skills (BCCS)

Basic Course on Computer Skills (BCCS) is being launched by Don Bosco College, Tura for the benefit of interested students. The course will help to develop computer literacy by providing both theoretical and practical knowledge in Computer Application.

The course is designed to improve the students' basic computer knowledge, computer typing skills and skill to surf Internet. These will be helpful in higher studies and in job market.

Certificates are awarded by the college to the students who successfully complete the course.

English Language Proficiency Course (ELPC)

English Language Proficiency Course (ELPC) seeks to improve English language skills by focusing on written and spoken communication, building capacity and help improve vocabulary, grammar, spelling, pronunciation, public speaking skills and expression. The course aims to prepare them for tests and interviews; to compere programmes or to speak in public. Adding Basic Course in Computer Applications and Hardware.

Basic Course in Computer Hardware (BCCH)

Basic Course on Computer Hardware (BCCH) is being launched by Don Bosco College, Tura for the benefit of interested students. The course will help students to learn to upgrade, repair, maintain and troubleshoot computers. This is a preliminary course recommended for candidates who wish to enter Network and System administration field.

Candidates who have pursued computer hardware course can take up jobs in various businesses ranging from start-ups to MNCs as all businesses require skilled individuals who can solve technical and network issues within organizations. Jobs are also available in departments of government and institutions of education.

Certificates are awarded by the college to the students who successfully complete the course.

Basic Course in Tally ERP9 (BCTE)

The Programme on Accounting with Tally.ERP9 would enable the students to record the business transactions and manage the accounts information for an organization using the popular Tally Software. This course gives you complete depth knowledge of all features of Tally. You can easily handle accounting and taxation of any types of business and also prepare MIS Reports.

Certificate Course in A·chik Folk Arts (CAFA)

This programme will introduction to the participants the concept of folklore, various types of folk Arts- music and dance in particular Folk Theatre. Lessons on Musical Instruments-Drum beating, trumpet-blowing, gong-beating and other instruments Lessons on Dancing including Warrior Dancing will be taught to the students. The objective of this programme is to impart / gain practical experience. It will consist of Theory: 50 - Marks and Practical: 50 - Marks

In addition, students will be able to solve his/her day-to-day tasks efficiently by using the various Office productivity tools such as Microsoft Word and Microsoft Excel, generally used for financial analysis and report making.

This short course is offered mainly to the B.Com students who are interested in accounting.

Certificates are awarded by the college to the students who successfully complete the course.

Guidance and Counselling

The College has a fully equipped guidance and counselling centre. The services of a professional counsellor are available for personal, group and career counselling. Students are encouraged to frequently interact with the counsellor for their personality development and career advancement.

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell of the College strives to raise the standards of the institution to higher levels, enhance and sustain quality, through monitoring of services and redressal of grievances. Students and staff are encouraged to provide suggestions and feedback.

NSS and NCC

The College offers NCC to boys and girls in the army wing. The NCC and NSS play an important role in making the students disciplined and patriotic. They develop in them qualities of patriotism, service and effective leadership.

Scholarship

The College promotes academic excellence by facilitating scholarships to meritorious students. The College tries to facilitate fee stipends, house rent allowance, travel allowance and financial loans for students.

Remedial Teaching

Education is meant not only to nurture excellence but also to develop academic skills, linguistic proficiency and qualitative techniques. The College organises and conducts coaching classes for weaker students.

House System

All the students are divided into Eight Houses. Most of the co-curricular and sports activities of the College, especially during the College Week, are routed through the Houses. The House

System aims to inculcate group work, leadership development, integration, healthy competition and genuine fun.

Student Welfare Association (SWA)

The College has a Student Welfare Association (SWA) to address student-related issues and for building up a team of leaders. Class representatives, who are elected by the respective classes, elect the office bearers of the Association. The Association works in close collaboration with the staff and management. SWA is not affiliated to any organization outside the College and does not take up issues not connected with the College.

Community Services

Apart from community services conducted by the NSS unit, the students of the College undertake extension activities including adoption of neighbourhood villages, teaching in neighbourhood schools, cleanliness drive in the College and neighbourhood, collection and distribution of relief materials for the needy and tree plantation within and outside the campus. Presently the college has adopted five villages under the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan (UBA) project of the Central Government.

Student Development Services

To develop the overall personality of the students the College organises the following courses: (i) Leadership Development; (ii) Value Education; (iii) Social Responsibility and Civic Values; (iv) Etiquette and Manners.

Groups of students are offered training programmes and educational tours, exposure visits and other extension activities. The College also facilitates regularly:

- Prayer and Spiritual Activities
- Career Placement
- Campus Recruitment
- Extension Lectures
- Observation of International and National Days.

XII. CODE OF ETHICS AND BEHAVIOURAL GUIDELINES

Code of ethics is an integral part of every Don Bosco Institution. It serves as a guideline for forming attitudes and directing conduct. Don Bosco College (DBC), being an institution committed to imparting value-based education, presupposes the existence of an environment of integrity. The faculty, students and administrative staff share the responsibility for maintaining this environment.

DBC expects this code to help mould every student into persons of integrity whose life is characterized by harmonious and God-centred life. All the members of the College community are expected to abide by this code in letter and in spirit, within and outside the campus:

- 1. DBC believes in and fosters personal, academic and professional integrity. Among other things, integrity calls for:
 - Being honest in examinations and assignments, avoiding plagiarism and misrepresentation of facts
 - Not using computers or other electronic devises to gain access to unauthorized information or objectionable websites.
 - Not evading legitimate financial obligations.
- 2. A student of DBC cultivates a basic Godorientation that contributes to the development of an integral healthy personality. This requires:
 - Respect for all religions and faith.
 - Active participation in the assembly and prayer sessions organized from time to time.
- 3. Avoiding substance abuse such as use of tobacco, alcohol, drugs, etc., within and outside the College Campus.
- 4. While cell phones have become very common, it is necessary that they be used with proper etiquette. Their use during academic activities and official functions violates this etiquette.



- Students are to keep their mobile phones in off mode while they are within the College Building. Those found not complying to the rules regarding use of mobile phones shall have to pay fines fixed by the college.
- Students may use their mobile phones outside the college building only. However, they may resort to mobile phones in the Common Rooms for academic purposes.
- Students may operate their mobile phones inside the classroom at the bidding and under the supervision of the teacher concerned.
- If any student is found violating the rules regarding mobile phones, he/she will have to pay fines as stipulated by the Discipline Committee of the College.
- 5. DBC being a Don Bosco Institution upholds the value of family spirit. This is to be ensured by:
 - Cordiality in relationship between and among students and staff members.
 - Harmonious living and respect for members of other communities and religions.

- Not taking part in divisive activities and partisan politics or forming associations which go counter to the spirit of harmonious living. While the college fosters associations which have representatives from among the students, staff and management, political activities are not permitted in the college premises.
- 6. Ragging and eve-teasing are activities which violate the dignity of the person and will not be tolerated. These will be dealt with according to the laws in force.
- 7. DBC values community service as an integral part of education. Whenever the college organizes programmes to achieve this end, students are expected to take part in these whole-heartedly.
- 8. Discipline is an essential aspect of the maturing process. The college shall provide an environment conducive to self-discipline. To maintain this environment:
 - Students shall treat teachers and those in authority with due respect.
 - Acts of indiscipline, insubordination and interference in administration are unacceptable.
- 9. Education is more than acquiring knowledge.
 - The college organizes programmes aimed at enhancing the skills of students. Active participation in these programmes is mandatory.
- 10. Care and respect for common facilities and utilities are an essential component of social responsibility. In view of this, any willful damage to college property must be made good by the persons concerned.
- 11. One's own safety as well as that of others should be a primary concern of every student. While the college makes every effort to provide a safe and secure environment for work and study, the responsibility for individual safety lies with

each student. The college cannot be held accountable for accidents due to carelessness or indiscipline.

- All terms and conditions set forth in this prospectus, including fees and dues etc. are liable to be revised whenever necessary.
- All payments are to be done through i-collect in the SBI, Chandmari, Tura, unless otherwise prescribed. The students are to


XIV. SALIENT FEATURES UNDER SEMESTER SYSTEM

Honours Degree Course

- The Honours Degree Course comprises of 6 (six) Semesters spread over 3 (three) Academic Years.
- Semester means a half-yearly programme or term of studies.
- 1st (First), 3rd (Third) & 5th (Fifth) are Odd Semesters.
- 2nd (Second), 4th (Fourth) & 6th (Sixth) are Even Semesters.

Conduct of Examination

- At the end of each Semester, there shall be an examination as per the Semester Academic Calendar as stipulated and fixed by NEHU.
- Evaluation in each course shall be on the basis of performance through continuous assessment and the end semester examinations. The weightage assigned to the continuous assessment and end semester examinations shall be in the ratio 1:3
- The pattern and schedule of continuous evaluation thereof shall be such as laid down in the relevant regulations.
- Students shall be allowed to proceed to the next semester irrespective of failed papers/arrear papers subject to payment of fees and fulfillment of other prescribed conditions laid down by the University.





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
